UCLan awards for ELHT clinicians

ELHT has been working closely with the University of Central Lancashire (UCLan) in the development of a joint strategy for education and research. In recognition of the contribution that ELHT staff are making to this work, UCLan have made a number of prestigious awards to clinical staff. Six ELHT clinicians have been awarded the title of Honorary Professor and a further 16 clinicians have been awarded Honorary Senior Clinical Lecturer status.

Research team and paramedics promote research and the PASTA trial



Members of the ELHT research team and paramedics from the North West Ambulance Service (NWAS) attended the NWAS annual fair to promote research and their recent involvement in the PASTA trial.

The study, co-ordinated by the Stroke Research Group at Newcastle University, is looking at whether a Paramedic Acute Stroke Treatment Assessment (PASTA) pathway can speed up access to emergency stroke treatments, especially thrombolysis treatment, and improve recovery after stroke.

NWAS and the ELHT research team recruited and collected data on 62 study patients.

Stephen Duberley, lead research nurse for the study at ELHT said "Most of the patients who consented to the study said how brilliant the ambulance crew were and that they were pleased to be helping out with the research."

Recruiter of the month for ELHT



Congratulations to the MifeMiso study team at Burnley General Teaching Hospital who became 'recruiter of the month' for August 2018. The MifeMiso study, led locally by Consultant Obstetrician and Principal Investigator, Mrs Bhatia, and co-ordinated by the Birmingham Clinical Trials Unit, is investigating the clinical and cost-effectiveness of drug treatment for the management of missed miscarriage. Women taking part in the study are randomised to receive a combination of the standard treatment misoprostol taken together with mifepristone versus misoprostol alone. To date 15 women have entered the study at ELHT.

Engage study

Following the introduction of UK clinical guidelines in 2013, the uptake of preventive therapy for women at increased risk of breast cancer in England was unknown. The Engage study evaluated socio-demographic and clinical factors associated with the uptake of tamoxifen and used qualitative interview data to explore women's experiences of making treatment decisions. East Lancashire women took part in the study. Karen Riley, Research Nurse and PI for the study at ELHT thanked members of staff in the breast family history clinic for their help in identifying participants for the study. The uptake of tamoxifen was low in the women studied. Their decision-making was influenced by familial priorities, particularly having children. The [full text](#) can be accessed online.

SNAP2: EpiCCS study

The results of the SNAP-2: EpiCCS study has been published in the British Journal of Anaesthesia. The study was supported by clinical and research teams across the Trust, over a 7 day period during March 2017. At ELHT, 191 patients together with 84 clinicians who provided inpatient surgery during the study period, contributed to the study. SNAP-2: EpiCCS aimed to describe the epidemiology of perioperative risk and outcome and critical care referral and admission, after inpatient surgery, in the UK. Data for 14,936 patients collected at 245 hospital trusts was analysed to determine the rates and reasons for last-minute surgical cancellations. Last-minute cancellations of elective surgical procedures negatively impact on patient experience and outcomes. One in 10 patients presenting for surgery in the SNAP-2: EpiCCS study had experienced a previous cancellation, primarily for non-clinical reasons including bed capacity and the requirement for postoperative critical care. FACT trial

Pre-eclampsia is a serious medical condition, affecting about 3-5% of pregnancies. It affects multiple organ systems, leads to an increased risk of severe complications in pregnancy and is a leading cause of indicated preterm delivery. The FACT study, conducted at ELHT under the direction of Consultant Obstetrician Miss Nugent, and at another 69 obstetric centres in Argentina, Australia, Canada, Jamaica, and the UK, investigated the efficacy of high dose folic acid supplementation for the prevention of pre-eclampsia in women at high risk of the condition. Thirty four women from RBTH & BGTH antenatal clinics joined the study in which a total of 2,464 pregnant women, with 8-16 completed weeks of gestation, were randomised to receive either daily folic acid (four 1.0 mg oral tablets) or placebo, until delivery. Supplementation with 4.0 mg/day folic acid beyond the first trimester did not prevent pre-eclampsia in women at high risk for this condition. Folic acid supplementation remains indicated in preconception and early pregnancy but there is a need to define when to discontinue supplementation. 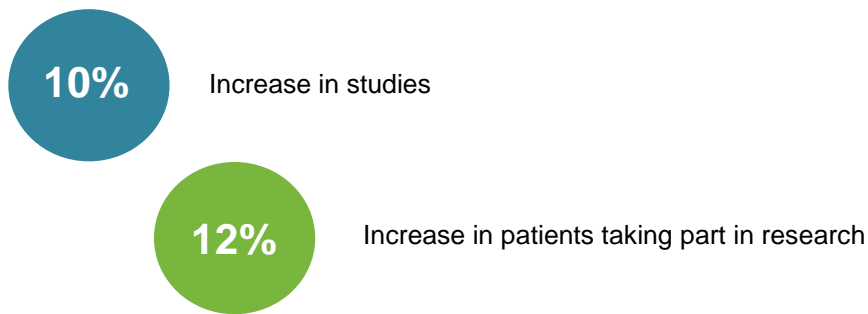
